## Milestones for progress

Because the threshold concepts are repeated in each year group it is important that students progress in their understanding of them. The curriculum at St Botolph's sets out this progression in the form of three 'Milestones'. Each Milestone contains a range of descriptors which give more detail to be discovered within the concept. Over a two year period students will become more and more familiar with these details by exploring them in a breadth of contexts. These descriptors are not exhaustive and should only be used as a guide for teachers. They should not be 'ticked off' as each one is covered: they should be repeated in as many different contexts as possible.

(Pencil, Ink, Charcoal and Pen)</p> <p>Combine a variety of printmaking techniques and materials to create a print on a theme. (Print)</p>	<p>Create a 3-D form using malleable materials in the style of a significant artist, architect or designer. (Malleable Materials)</p> <p>Combine the qualities of different materials including paper, fabric and print techniques to create textural effects. (Fabric and Paper)</p> <p>Use colour palettes and characteristics of an artistic movement or artist in artwork. (Paint)</p> <p>Use line and tone to draw perspective. (Pencil, Ink, Charcoal and Pen)</p> <p>Add text or photographic samples to a print. Use the work of a significant printmaker to influence artwork. (Print)</p>
